






The result of a three-year research project on the Sanjay Gandhi National Park and Aarey Colony, this exhibition aims to explore the relationship between objects, culture and environment through 'folk', 'tribal' and 'contemporary' art, as well as maps and documents of the changing lands of the city. Presented by the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya and the Jehangir Nicholson Art Foundation in collaboration with Kamla Raheja Vidyanidhi Institute for Architecture and Environmental Studies and the Pani Haq Samiti, the thought-provoking showcase brings forth questions of identity, culture and rights of forest communities.

Now in its fifteenth year, Chatterjee & Lal's periodic exhibit *Simple Tales* continues to showcase objects and artefacts from different artistic timelines and in diverse media, believing this to be an enriching and productive process in the art world. The objects included in the show are featured both for their aesthetic beauty as well as the stories they convey about <u>culture</u>, people and lives in the subcontinent, making for a splendid exhibit of our region's art and design histories.

Walking Through a Songline at KNMA, Saket

Little is known in India about Australian history, including that the country is home to the world's oldest continuous Indigenous culture. To showcase these ancient stories, the Australian High Commission in India and the Kiran Nadar Museum of Art present a special immersive multimedia installation Walking Through a Songline that takes viewers on a journey through First Nations' art, culture and history. This innovative exhibit, which will travel to Bengaluru in the coming months, provides viewers with the unique opportunity of experiencing an age-old culture and learning more about Aboriginal communities.

Serving as a platform for <u>personal narratives</u> and an exploration of human life, this group exhibition showcases how shared spaces and narratives can bind people together in parallel ways. Curated by Andrea Anastasio and featuring artworks by Stefano Arienti, Mayank Austen Soofi, Alice Cattaneo, Elisabetta Di Maggio, Parul Gupta, Martand Khosla, Ayesha Singh, Dayanita Singh, Diwik Singh and Viswanadhan, the show offers a glimpse into how different <u>identities</u> combine within the boundaries of real and imagined cities.

Hello & Goodbye: Postcards from the Early 20th Century at MAP, Bengaluru

Public Buildings, Bombay, Unknown c. 1907

Handwritten letters, stamps, telegrams and <u>postcards</u> may be elements of a bygone era, but their historical, social and cultural values hold strong and tell many stories of past generations even today. This exhibition features around 80 postcards from colonial times from both European and Indian printing presses, showcasing the differences in their imagery and quality while also throwing light on the forgotten but endearing method of postcard communication. The show also includes interactive experiences where viewers can create their own postcard souvenirs to take home.

Cracks and Folds - Landscapes of Southern Rajasthan at 47A, Mumbai

The Aravali mountain range, one of the oldest geological formations in the world, forms the backdrop of many regions of Western India including Rajasthan. This intriguing art show curated by Abhijeet Karwa features works by several artists who have painted a <u>unique portrait</u> of the region by showcasing its changing ecologies through various materials and media.
